

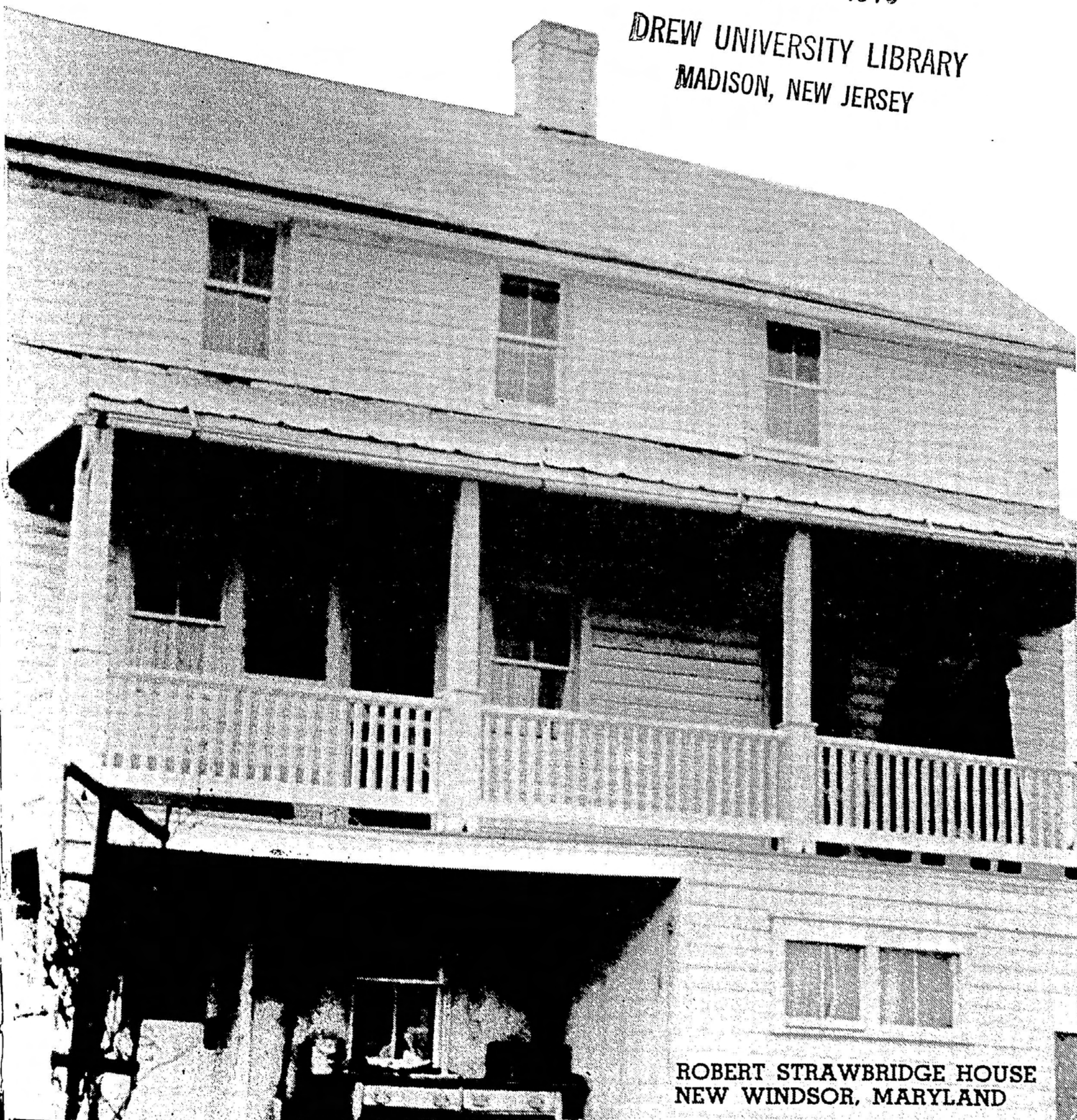

CONTRIBUTORS

K. JAMES STEIN, Professor of Church History at Evangelical Theological Seminary, received the B.A. degree from Westmar College, B.D. from Evangelical Theological Seminary, and the S.T.M. and Th.D. degrees from Union Theological Seminary. He has served pastoral appointments in North and South Dakota, Illinois, and New Jersey, in the former Evangelical United Brethren Church, and has been a member of the Seminary faculty since 1960. He is also a member of the American Society of Church History.

ROY W. TRUEBLOOD, a native of Illinois and a member of the Central Illinois Annual Conference, The United Methodist Church, was educated at Millikin University (A.B.) and Garrett Theological Seminary (B.D.). He served four years as Campus Minister and Director of Wesley Foundation at Eastern Illinois University. In 1968 he received a Danforth Campus Ministry Grant and is presently completing requirements for the Ph.D. degree at Garrett and Northwestern.

J. EDWARD MADDOX, a member of the Northern New Jersey Annual Conference, is pastor of Tranquility United Methodist Church, Tranquility, New Jersey.

FRANK BAKER, Professor of English Church History at The Divinity School, Duke University and Editor-in-Chief of the Wesley Works Editorial Project, is a noted Wesley scholar and a frequent contributor to *Methodist History*.

The house of Robert Strawbridge, about two miles from New Windsor, Maryland, was one of the first Methodist monuments to be designated a national historic shrine by the General Conference. The original log structure has been considerably enlarged, but it is the house from which the Irish local preacher went out to proclaim the Gospel.
