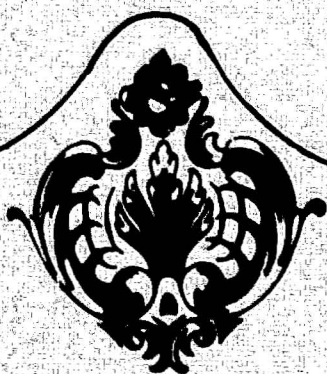

CONTRIBUTORS

THOMAS D. ISERN, an American historian with research interests in the American West, received his Ph.D. degree from Oklahoma State University in 1977. He currently is visiting assistant professor of history at Emporia State University, Emporia, Kansas.

PATRICIA R. HILL holds an M.T.S. in church history from Harvard Divinity School and is a Ph.D. candidate in Harvard's History of American Civilization program. Her dissertation is a study of the women's foreign mission movement, 1870-1920. She is Assistant Head Tutor of Harvard's interdisciplinary, undergraduate program in History and Literature and was co-editor of a collection of essays published by Fortress Press in 1974 under the title *Confusion and Hope: Clergy, Laity and the Church in Transition*.

REGINALD F. HILDEBRAND is a doctoral candidate at Princeton University. The title of his dissertation is "Race, Religion and Politics: A Study of Freedmen and the Methodist Church during Reconstruction."

LEWIS V. BALDWIN is Research Associate and Resource Person at The Institute for Black Religious Research, Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary. He holds the B.A. from Talladega College, the M.A. and M.Div. degrees from Colgate-Rochester Divinity School, and the Ph.D. from Northwestern University. His dissertation was titled "'Invisible' Strands in African Methodism: A History of the African Union Methodist Protestant and Union American Methodist Episcopal Churches, 1805-1980."
