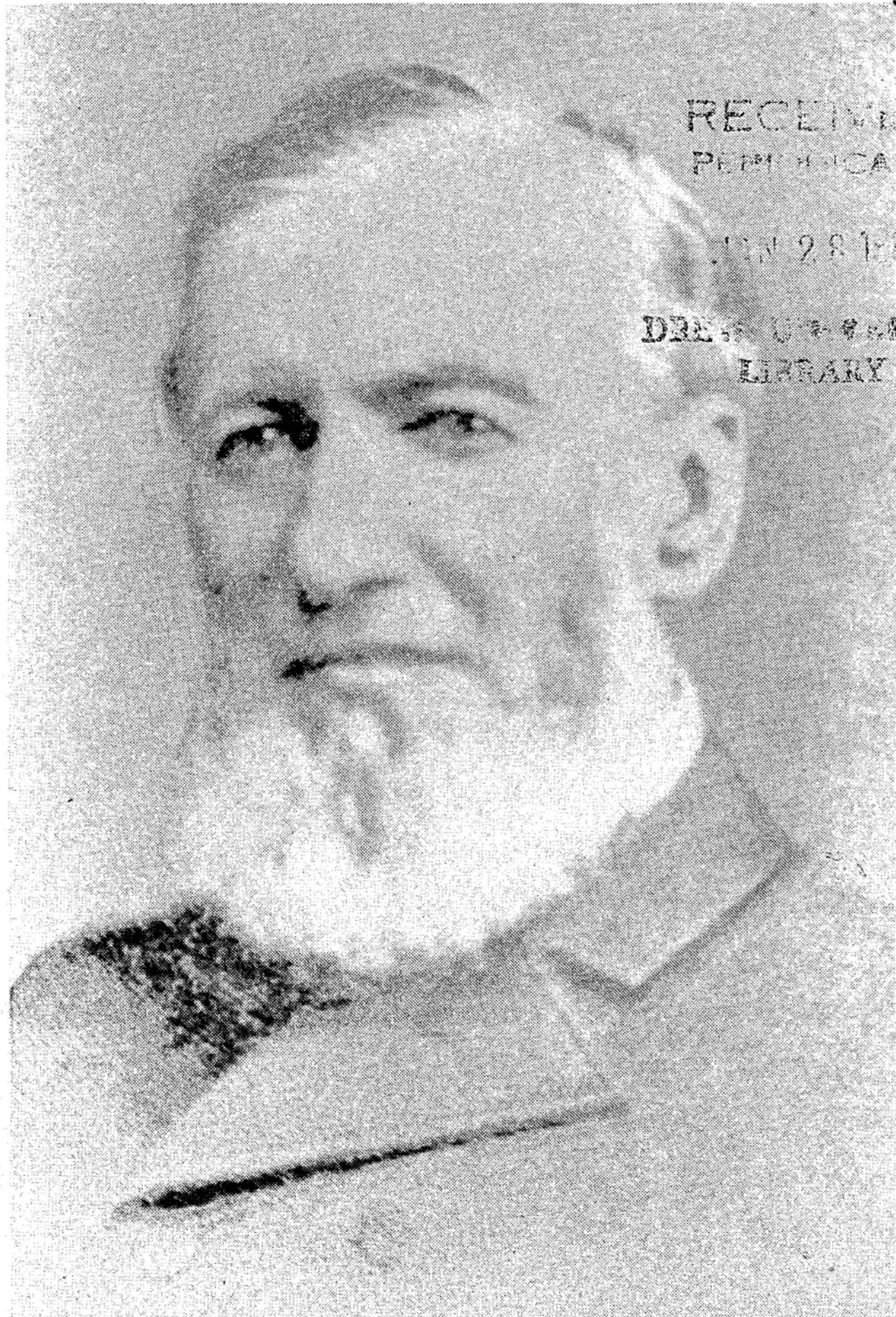

CONTRIBUTORS

NELL BROWN PROPST is a freelance writer and director who lives on a cattle ranch established by her husband's family over a hundred years ago. That family helped to start the first Methodist churches in the area, and Missouri Propst was a great-aunt of the author's husband. Mrs. Propst is a graduate of Samford University and earned her M.A. at the University of Denver. She is the author of *Forgotten People, A History of the South Platte Trail*, for which she received a certificate of commendation from the American Association for State and Local History.

ELIZABETH M. SMITH holds a B.A. from Rocky Mountain College, and is a student of western history. She has written the histories for the Salmon and Boise National Forests, both in Idaho. Mrs. Smith arranged the Idaho Methodist Archival Collection now on deposit with the Idaho State Historical Society, and has published an index for this collection. She has been active in the Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference Commission on Archives and History, and was a member of the General Commission, 1976-1981.
