CONTRIBUTORS

GERALD O. McCULLOH, Director of the Department of Ministerial Education, United Methodist General Board of Education, is a native of Kansas. He received the B.A. degree from Baker, the M.A. and S.T.B. degrees from Boston, and the Ph.D. from the University of Edinburgh. He served as a pastor and on the faculties of Hamline and Garrett prior to assuming his present position in 1953. The paper published herein was presented by Dr. McCulloh at the dedication of the Cokesbury College Monument on May 25, 1968.

DEWEY M. BEEGLE, Professor of Old Testament at Wesley Theological Seminary, is a native of Seattle, Washington, and was educated at Seattle Pacific College (B.S.), Asbury Theological Seminary (B.D.), and The Johns Hopkins University (Ph.D.). His service includes pastorates in Baltimore and New York, consultant and researcher in the Translations Department of the American Bible Society, and faculty positions at Asbury Seminary and The Biblical Seminary in New York. Dr. and Mrs. Beegle have been members of the following archaeological excavation teams: Shechem (Tell Balatah), 1964; Gezer, 1965; and Heshbon, 1968. His published works include *God's Word Into English* (Harper, 1960) and *The Inspiration of Scripture* (Westminster, 1963).

JOHN A. VICKERS, Senior Lecturer in Religious Studies at the College of Education, Bognor Regis, Sussex, England, earned the B.D. degree at Birmingham University. His biography of Thomas Coke is scheduled to come from the press this year. Mr. Vickers is a member of the Archives Committee of the British Conference, of the Wesley Historical Society Executive, and of the International Methodist Historical Society (British Section). He has contributed previously to this publication.

J. GORDON MELTON was admitted into full connection in the North Alabama Conference of The United Methodist Church in 1968. He is a graduate of Birmingham-Southern College and received the B.D. degree from Garrett School of Theology, where he is presently doing graduate work.
