CONTRIBUTORS

ODD HAGEN, President of the World Methodist Council for the period 1966-1971, is a native of Norway, but is now a Swedish citizen. He was educated at Trondheim College, The Union Scandinavian School of Theology, Oslo University, and Gothenburg University. Bishop Hagen served local churches in Norway 1927-1935, was professor in Systematic Theology at The Union Scandinavian School of Theology 1935-1947, and served as Principal in the same Seminary from 1947 until his election to the Episcopacy in 1953. He presides in the Northern Europe Episcopal Area. Bishop Hagen has written 14 books and many newspaper and magazine articles. The address printed herein was delivered by Bishop Hagen when he was installed as President of the World Methodist Council at the close of the 1966 World Methodist Conference in Central Methodist Hall, London, August 26, 1966.

JOHN C. ENGLISH has contributed previously to our magazine. He is now Chairman of the Department of History and Political Science at Baker University in Kansas.

ELMER F. SUDERMAN, Associate Professor of English at Gustavus Adolphus College in Minnesota, prepared his Ph.D. dissertation on "Religion in the American Novel: 1870-1900," and the article printed in this magazine grew out of that dissertation. Dr. Suderman is the author of a number of articles.

RONALD A. BRUNGER, a native of Michigan, received the A.B. degree from Albion College and the M.A. and S.T.B. degrees from Boston University. He is a member of the Detroit Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, pastor of First Church, Fowlerville, and is the author of a number of articles on Michigan Methodist history.

TOMMY W. ROGERS, assistant professor of Social Science at Northwestern State College of Louisiana, received the Ph.D. degree from Mississippi State University. He says that he has an "amateur interest in history," and he is the author of several historical articles.
