CONTRIBUTORS

WALTER N. VERNON, Chairperson of the Commission on Archives and History, South Central Jurisdiction, is a native of Oklahoma and a member of the North Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church. He was educated at Southern Methodist University (B.A., M.A., B.D.). In 1944 Dr. Vernon was appointed as Editor of General Publications and Administrative Associate in the Editorial Division of the Board of Education, The Methodist Church, and served in that capacity until retirement. He is Conference Historian of the North Texas Conference and President of the Texas United Methodist Historical Society. He is the author of a number of published works, the latest being *Methodism in Arkansas, 1816-1976* (1976), and editor and one of three authors of *One in the Lord* (1976). Dr. Vernon also serves as a member of the General Commission on Archives and History and on its Committee on Ethnic Heritage and History.

LUANN FOSTER PILKINGTON, a native of Wenatchee, Washington, majored in journalism in Los Angeles and began work in Seattle as a newspaper reporter and feature writer. She was an editor at New York University Press before moving to Nashville to become an editor with the Methodist Publishing House. She served as research assistant for the history of the Publishing House, written by her husband, James Pilkington. For the last six years Mrs. Pilkington has edited the daily network evening news broadcasts for the Television News Archive at Vanderbilt University.

FRANK BATEMAN STANGER, President of Asbury Theological Seminary, is a native of New Jersey and a member of the Southern New Jersey Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church. He was educated at Asbury College (A.B., magna cum laude), Princeton Theological Seminary (Th.B.), Temple University (S.T.M.), and Philathea College (S.T.D.).
