Contributors

FRANK BAKER, a clergyman in the British Methodist Conference, is now Associate Professor of English Church History at the Divinity School, Duke University, Durham, North Carolina. Dr. Baker is one of the foremost Methodist historians of the present day. He is a member of the Editorial Board composed of professors from four seminaries—Duke, Drew, Emory, and Southern Methodist—which has assumed editorial responsibility for bringing out a critical edition of the complete prose works of John Wesley. The article, *Early American Methodism: A Key Document*, is Dr. Baker's second contribution to METHODIST HISTORY, the first being *The Beginnings of American Methodism*, which appeared in the October 1963 number of the magazine.

SAMUEL J. FANNING comes from County Tipperary, Ireland, next-door neighbor to County Limerick where Philip Embury was born. Dr. Fanning completed his secondary education before emigrating to America, and then received a B.A. degree from the University of Chicago and an M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of California at Berkeley. He taught history at George Washington University for four years, and at the beginning of the present academic year accepted a position as Assistant Professor of History at St. John's University, Long Island. Dr. Fanning is a Roman Catholic. Perhaps this article on Philip Embury will make a contribution to the present-day dialogue between Protestants and Catholics.

MARGARET B. MACMILLAN, a native of Michigan, is Professor of History at Western Michigan University. Her father, Smith Burnham, was head of the History Department at Western Michigan University for twenty-one years. Her maternal grandfather, Elisha E. Caster, was a member of the Detroit Annual Conference for fifty-four years. Dr. Macmillan received the B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Michigan and a Ph.D. from Columbia University. For the past four years she has been engaged in collecting material and writing a *History of Methodism in Michigan* for the two annual conferences of The Methodist Church in that State. It is expected that the volume will be published within a year.

WESLEY NORTON, a native of Michigan, is associate professor of history at Lamar State College, Beaumont, Texas. Dr. Norton received his Ph.D. from the University of Illinois in 1959. He is the author of several historical articles.
